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**Main Feature: MAKE DREAMS REAL—Some children don't even have the courage to**

The human condition is a truly a strange one which is rife with contradiction. We all, at one point or another, have children in our lives, be it our own or those of loved ones. The love for these children is immeasurable, and the very prospect of the death of our child is unbearable and almost unfathomable in our hearts and minds. The thought of that little child going without food, suffering defilement at the hands of depraved adults, writhing in pain from disease, being ridiculed by other children due to their inability to read, or generally suffering whatever humiliation that could befall them, is impossible to accept.

The human race prides itself in the global family we've made for ourselves what with all the technological advancements, etc, that we've seen over the years. But I wonder, why is it then that some members of this 'family' are more equal than others?



**"...Nearly 10 million children worldwide under the age of five die each year - more than 1000 every hour."**

These child deaths are caused directly by illnesses such as pneumonia, diarrhea and malaria, while others are caused indirectly by other factors including war and HIV/AIDS. Malnutrition, poor hygiene and lack of access to safe water and adequate sanitation contribute to more than half of these deaths. Further, as much as it's known that when children learn to read and write they gain skills in problems solving and community building, and are equipped to transform their communities, literacy rates remain low.

LA CONVENTION 15- 18TH JUNE 08**

Hollywood's glamour added to the excitement of the 99th Rotary International Convention, which began on 15th June 08 in Los Angeles. The annual event brings Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Rotary Foundation alumni from around the world.

About 18,000 attendees from as far as Afghanistan, Brazil, Germany, and Zambia converged on L.A. for the convention, from 15 to 18 June.

At the official opening of the exhibition area, the House of Friendship, on Saturday morning, RI President Wilfrid J. Wilkinson welcomed all to L.A. "The world is here to see Rotary, and the Los Angeles Rotarians are playing host to the world," he said. "It's a fantastic experience for them -- and a great honor for me." The convention marked the official launch of Rotary's drive to raise \$100 million to match a challenge grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, with all funds raised going toward polio eradication.

The plenary sessions included Rotary's partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, global experts on health – UNICEF Executive Director Anne Veneman, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Director Julie Gerberding, and World Health Organization Director-General Margaret Chan, Stephen Lewis, co-director of AIDS-Free World, and William Asiko, president of the Coca-Cola Foundation Africa.

But even as they shared ideas, network, and got projects off the ground, Rotarians enjoyed the convention's fun and fellowship. District Governor Chris Mutalya led a strong delegation from District 9200 of over 320 Rotarians which included the District Governor Elect Kaushik Manek, District Governor nominee Tadesse Alemu and other members.

## MAKE DREAMS REAL – CONTINUED FROM P 1

... A large gap exists between the welfare of children below the age of five in developed and developing countries, with the latter having 14 times higher risk of death than those in developed nations. For example, despite a marginal improvement, over the last few years, in the number of deaths of these children under 5 years of age in the countries of District 9200, at 74 in Eritrea, 123 in Ethiopia, 121 in Kenya, 118 in the Republic of Tanzania, and 134 in Uganda, this statistic remains higher than the global average of 72. The poor welfare of these children is exasperated by the poor health conditions experienced by their parents as a result of HIV/AIDS, maternal deaths during pregnancy and childbirth, and poor maternal education levels, among other issues. Furthermore, many children are unfortunate enough to encounter sexual predators, resulting in a lifetime of physical and psychological trauma.

Despite the fact that we consider the children in our lives to be worth much more than their weight in gold, many of us comfortably watch and hear of other people's children go through these humiliations and injustices, many



times without so much as a bat of an eyelid. When I consider the alarming facts, I am overwhelmed with such a sense of guilt, and feel like there is something that I need to do to turn this mess around. It's an anomaly that is so hard to understand, especially because, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO), over 6 million of these child deaths every year are preventable.

So, I ask you, in this global village that we live in, how can we reduce the inequalities that exist? What are we going to do in our communities and beyond to avert these pointless deaths? What can we do to make it up to the world's children who have lost their lives simply due to neglect and denial of basic human needs by the wider community?

**How are you going to help make dreams real?**

## RI BOARD ADOPTS FUTURE VISION PLAN

At its June meeting, the RI Board adopted the **Future Vision Plan** for The Rotary Foundation, a far-reaching effort to simplify access to the Foundation, direct more resources to projects with high-impact and sustainable outcomes, and gain greater public recognition for the Foundation's work. The Board agreed to initiate the three-year pilot in July 2010 to focus resources and attention on Rotary's number one priority, polio eradication, and *Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge*. The Foundation will be sharing more information about the plan and its implementation throughout 2008-09 and will incorporate training for pilot districts into Rotary's standard training cycle.

Under the Future Vision Plan, the Foundation will offer two kinds of grants: *Rotary Foundation District Grants*, which provide districts with access to up to 50 percent of their District Designated Fund, and *Rotary Foundation Global Grants*, which support larger projects with sustainable, high-impact outcomes in one of six areas of focus: peace and conflict prevention/resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, and economic and community development. Clubs and districts can either create their own global grant projects in the areas of focus or sponsor packaged global grants, which The Rotary Foundation will develop in conjunction with a *strategic partner* organization that has expertise in the selected area of focus.

All districts will be encouraged to apply to participate in the pilot. In selecting pilot participants, the Trustees will attempt to compose a representative group of districts in terms of location, size, effectiveness, and level of involvement with the Foundation. Pilot districts will follow the new grant structure and not participate in *current Foundation programs*, with the exception of PolioPlus and the Rotary Centers for International Studies. Interested districts will need to secure the agreement of two-thirds of their clubs and complete the pilot application form online between February and June 2009. The list of selected pilot districts will be posted on the RI Web site on 1 July 2009. The 2010-11 governors and Foundation chairs of the selected pilot districts will attend mandatory training sessions at RI's expense in early 2010.

## THE ROTARY FOUNDATION FUTURE VISION: OVERVIEW

In anticipation of The Rotary Foundation's 100-year anniversary in 2017, the Trustees set out in 2005 to develop a 10-year vision with a three-year plan to move the Foundation

toward its second century of service. This vision and plan reflect input from a wide variety of stakeholders through interviews, surveys, focus groups, and input sessions and include a comprehensive approach for setting goals and a roadmap for successful execution.

A vision was developed for the Foundation – Enabling Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace – which became the basis for the Foundation's new mission statement:

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

The Foundation's new mission and vision, along with its new motto – Doing Good in the World – were approved by the Foundation Trustees and the RI Board and endorsed by the Council on Legislation.

### The Future Vision Plan is designed to

Simplify Foundation programs and processes consistent with the mission

Focus Rotarian service efforts where they will have the greatest impact by addressing priority world needs that are relevant to Rotarians

Offer program options to help achieve both global and local goals

Increase the sense of ownership at the district and club levels by transferring more decisions to the districts

Gain greater understanding of The Rotary Foundation's work and enhance Rotary's public image

With a goal of full implementation by 2013-14, the Future Vision Plan offers new models for

- Grants structure
- Strategic partnerships
- Distributable funds

"Being everything to everyone has left the Foundation struggling to realize its mission. The new structure allows us to build on our strengths and realize more sustainable outcomes." – Robert S. Scott, 2007-08 Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair

### Grants structure

Under the new grants structure model, the Foundation will provide two types of grants:

Rotary Foundation District Grants allow clubs and districts to support their specific service interests and address immediate needs in their communities and abroad. Provided as block grants to districts, these grants are modeled after the current District Simplified Grants program. Districts will be able to use up to 50 percent of their District Designated Fund to support these grants.

Rotary Foundation Global Grants offer opportunities to participate in more strategically focused, sustainable activities with greater support from the Foundation. These grants

will fund larger projects with sustainable, high-impact outcomes in one of six area of focus corresponding to the Foundation's mission:

Peace and conflict prevention/resolution

Disease prevention and treatment

Water and sanitation

Maternal and child health

Basic education and literacy

Economic and community development

Club and districts can either create their own global grant projects in the areas of focus or sponsor packaged grants developed by The Rotary Foundation in conjunction with its strategic partners.

### Strategic partnerships

The Rotary Foundation will form strategic partnerships with organizations that specialize in one of the strategic areas of focus. These organizations would provide financial support, technical expertise, and/or advocacy efforts in projects and activities that are designed jointly with the Foundation and include Rotarian participation. In addition to increasing the impact of Foundation grants, these relationships will offer opportunities to achieve greater recognition of Rotary's work.

### Distributable funds

A distributable funds model is designed to simplify the funding process.

Rotary Foundation District Grants will be funded by a percentage of District Designated Fund (DDF) provided as a block grant. During the three-year pilot, districts may use up to 50 percent of their available DDF to support smaller local and international projects and broadened activities.

Rotary Foundation Global Grants will provide a World Fund match for club- and district-designed educational and humanitarian grant projects; package grant projects will be funded through a competitive process by the World Fund, Foundation earned income, and contributions from strategic partners. Designed to achieve the most effective and strategic use of Foundation resources in reaching sustainable outcomes, the package grant projects will not require club and district financial support.

### Implementation

The Future Vision Plan will be implemented in stages. In 2008-09, the Trustees will select approximately 100 districts to participate in a pilot that will run 2010-13. In selecting the pilot participants, the Trustees will attempt to compose a representative group in terms of location, size, effectiveness, and level of involvement with the Foundation. The remaining districts will continue to use the current programs and grants processes until global implementation of the new grant structure in 2013.
